

WHAT THIS IS ABOUT

The Road Safety 365 workshop provides local agencies with practical and effective ways to mainstream safety solutions into their day-to-day activities and project development process.

This workshop focuses on processes for incorporating safety into all aspects of local and rural road projects, and on making safety a priority through inclusion in the traditional decision-making process—365 days a year. The course stresses the importance of road safety and illustrates how it can be integrated into local transportation project development at all stages: planning, design, construction, implementation, operations, and maintenance. Through practical exercises and facilitator-led discussions, the emphasis is on operations and maintenance to reflect the predominant, day-to-day responsibilities of local transportation agencies. The benefits and potential cost savings of safety initiatives are shown using examples from local agencies.

After completing this course, participants will be able to:

- Explain the need for making roads safer.
- Separate safety myths from reality.
- Demonstrate how to "read the road."
- Describe practical and low-cost countermeasures to improve safety, both on existing roads and during the design stage.
- Identify effective ways of encouraging communities to make their roads safer.
- Create an action list for implementing at least one safety improvement at their local agency.

This workshop is aimed primarily at local and rural road and/or public works supervisors. While road safety concepts are presented at an introductory level, the workshop may also serve as a refresher for experienced road safety professionals.

INSTRUCTOR Todd Morrison, P.E.

Mr. Morrison is a road safety advocate as a speaker, workshop instructor, and online trainer. For the past fourteen years he has worked for numerous Local Technical Assistance Programs, Cities, Counties, Contractors, and DOT's. He has taught over 700 workshops and trained over 21000 individuals. He retired from the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet after serving in the Divisions of Construction, Maintenance and Traffic. At the Cabinet, he worked with environmental. work zone, construction and maintenance concerns as a Resident/Construction Engineer, Maintenance/ Traffic Engineer, Environmental Coordinator, and as a Branch Manager for Maintenance and Operations. Todd served for two years as Kentucky's Safety Circuit Rider helping local agencies identify low-cost improvements to reduce crashes. He also served for two years as a Road Safety Subject Matter Expert for the Tribal Technical Assistance Program. Todd is an ATSSA certified Traffic Control Supervisor, Flagging Instructor, and Traffic Control Design Specialist.
